His first job was working on an experimental way of making titanium dioxide (pigment used in white paint). They relocated from VA to PA and Frank worked for five years at Armstrong and then RCA as manager of quality reliability. He retired after 28 years with RCA.

Frank and Mary Ann have eight birth children; seven boys and one girl. They also have 21 grandchildren. Through the years they welcomed many foster children into their home for several weeks up to a year and a half. One of the foster daughters they have now adopted. They also

welcomed refugee families from Bosnia and Viet Nam to live with them during times of transition. Mary Ann said, "We learned from the refugees that they are just like us. They want the same things, have hopes and dreams in life, just like we do." They are pleased that their home was large enough for a big family and also had in-law quarters on the second floor. Mary Ann's mother lived there for 14 years

and Frank's parents for 8 years. They both feel very happy to be able to provide this.

Frank coached baseball for 40 years, was involved with the Big Brother program, enjoyed bowling, bridge and pinochle. Mary Ann enjoyed anything that went along with making a comfortable home for her husband and family. She supported Frank in all of his activities and spent free time reading, knitting and gardening. Frank added, "I thank Mary Ann for allowing me to indulge in my many interests."

The Hinnenkamps have wonderful memories of camping as a family. Following retirement they traveled to every state except Hawaai, visited all of the Canadian provinces, Europe, Ireland and took two delightful cruises. A very special memory is the ten week trip they took in a motor home to Alaska with their good friends, Marty and Dot Schober.

They have been active members of St. Leo's Catholic Church. Frank was a member of the parish council and on the school board. They hosted many church and community parties in their home.

Frank and Mary Ann continue to extend their welcome here at Evergreen. They are quick to offer a chair by the fireplace to anyone who stops by to visit. Mary Ann said, "Evergreen is a great place to be if one can not be in their own home."
