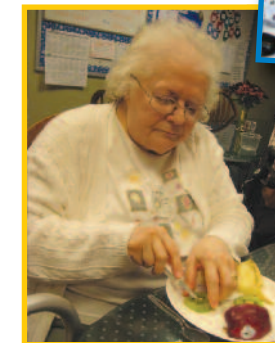

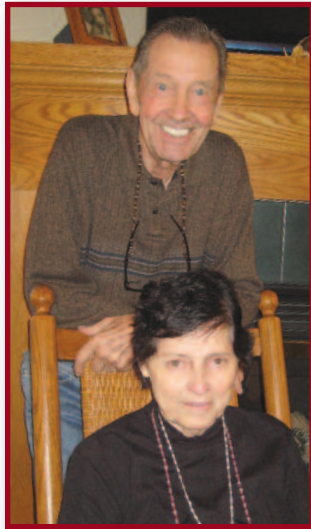

Together they played golf at least three times a week. John got a hole in one on April 10, 1979, at the Nellis Air Force Base Golf Course. It was hole #12, Par #3! They enjoy dancing and traveling in the mid west and western states. A favorite vacation spot is the scenery of Montana and the Arizona and Nevada desert. They also enjoyed a wonderful Caribbean Cruise.

Before coming to Evergreen, John and Pauline lived in Sun City Summerlin, Las Vegas, which had three golf courses, three fitness centers and their own security police made up of residents living there. The community suited their active lifestyle very well.

Vickie spent the first two years of her life living in Panama City, Florida, where her father was stationed in the Air

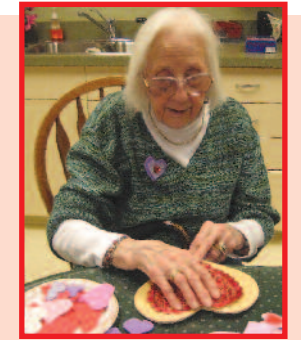
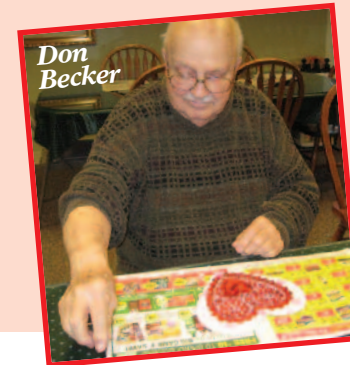
